Extra Care Housing Scheme for Woodley gets planning permission

The Extra Care Housing development in South Lake Crescent was given planning permission on 16th September to provide homes for older people, where they will be able to lead as full and independent a life as possible, while having the back up of 24-hour care and the latest care technology if they need it. They will be able to bring pets!

Online Marriage Registration

The Registration Service's new online system goes live on 16th November, to bring marriages in line with births, deaths and civil partnerships. Eventually, the registrars will not hand-write marriage entries in the registers during the wedding ceremony. However, this will require a change in legislation and is a few years away yet.

Council continues support for Loddon Bridge Park and Ride

The Loddon Bridge Park and Ride will be making changes to keep it viable. The service has been making a considerable financial loss for the past few years, and has had to be carefully looked at to ensure local taxpayers aren't forced to prop up the service in the future.

NEWS OF THE LIME

The iconic lime tree, which has been gracing St Nicholas churchyard for over a century, has had a radical change to its appearance. An extensive reduction of the crown has been carried out. This will reduce the lever-arm effect of the branches and relieve the pressure on the root ball. Previously, cable braces had been fitted and these, as growth continued, became 'over tight'.

A scientific survey established that unfortunately the tree had fallen foul to *kretzschmaria deusta*. *Kretzschmaria* is an organism that not infrequently is found in trees of this type, but is difficult to detect. This fungus can seriously weaken the whole structure without showing any adverse effects on growth and general appearance, and in extreme circumstances, it leads to a sudden breakage of the stem.

This tree has been admired and loved by generations for many years, so our first wish was to save it, if at all possible. Hence urgent remedial action was needed. We are hoping that this will prolong its life a little longer, but we are faced with its inevitable removal at a later date.

Fantastic News

Hurst Parish Council have been selected to receive a grant from Wokingham Borough Council via Play England. The £45,000 will be used to create another play area in our recreation ground in School Road. The aim is to target the 8-13 year olds and over the next few weeks the Council will be developing plans to ensure that the work is completed by the grant deadline of end March 2010.

I would particularly like to thank Councillor Penny Curry who has been the driving force behind this project.

School Road Improvements

At long, long last, works to finish the improvements are now scheduled for the end of October/beginning of November. I must apologise for any inconvenience and for the appearance of the area in front of the park. As reported over several issues of the newsletter, the problems have been down to ownership and agreeing specific licences with Wokingham Borough Council.

The Parish Council are now following the official complaints process with Wokingham Borough. We feel that the Chief Executive should be made aware of the way we have been treated whilst only trying to improve our village!

Traffic

Latest update – Wokingham Borough Council have now agreed to move the non-functioning Vehicle Activated Sign on the A321. Work to install entrance type gates to the three main access roads is still progressing. WBC have decided they need to formalise our request into policy to ensure that we comply with Highway Law. That said, I'm still positive they will go ahead.

POLICE REPORT

From PCSO Anne Chalmers

Good news!! ☺

Over the last three months there has been a significant reduction in burglaries across the area. The Neighbourhood Police team continue to conduct high visibility patrols. At our street briefings, residents can talk with the team, when we answer your questions and give crime reduction advice.

The results are promising. However, I would still urge residents to be vigilant. Please do not leave your property or car keys on display.

Number plate thefts

There have been a number of thefts of front and rear vehicle registration plates. This is occurring across the area. I understand that most number plates are now stuck on with an adhesive, as opposed to the use of screws. We have found that some of the stolen number plates are then used to obtain petrol from service stations without paying. We recommend you use tamper proof screws on your number plate.

Anti-social behaviour

In my last update I mentioned reported instances of anti-social behaviour (ASB) in the village. These include unacceptable behaviour at the Youth shelter, usually late at night or in the early hours of the morning. Also property "For Sale" signs have been removed and thrown into the village pond. We continue to patrol areas of concern. Speeding

Speeding is always an issue. This month, PCSO Anne Chalmers and PC T. Neblett conducted focused speed surveys using the speed indication device (SID) on Lodge Road and the A321 Wokingham Road. Results identified several motorists travelling in excess of 30mp. These individuals will be contacted by the Neighbourhood Police Team. The results of the survey will also be passed to our Traffic Police Team.

Still on the topic of traffic, residents of Dunt Lane and Lines Road have raised concerns regarding the volume, speed and validity of vehicle using these two lanes. We have responded with focused patrols of these two lanes, stopping vehicles on the lanes and ascertaining their use. For those drivers who did not adhere to the 'Access only' road signs, suitable advice was given. In future we will be issuing fixed penalty fines.

PCSO Anne Chalmers continues to monitor and deal as necessary with the issue of school parking.

During October, approximately 500 tonnes of sludge were removed from the pond; the gradual build up had left us with a very shallow pond.

Some willows were also removed, as they were becoming a danger to the highway, along with several hundred bulrushes, which were taking over the pond.

Thank you all for your comments of approval. The whole process has taken up a lot of our valuable spare time. We had to ensure that the project was completed very quickly before the rain came and the pond filled up again.

The mummers were led by Father Christmas in the correct attire and with a long white beard. He stumped around, leaning on his stick and reciting:

Christmas comes but once a year
And when it comes, it brings good cheer,
Roast beef, plum pudden, mince pies.
The geese are getting fat,
Please to put a penny in the old man's hat.

Then he would introduce 'King George' – a fine, upstanding young man (incidentally, the village gamekeeper) resplendent in a navy blue uniform and much yellow braid. He was asked to fight the 'Turk', who proved to be a man with a very black face and a very odd costume.

They immediately set to, and after much sword play and dodging round and round the ring, the 'Turk' fell to the ground, lying silent and still. Father Christmas then called, 'Is there a doctor to be found?' and out stepped a man in a long black coat and top hat. From his black bag he took a bottle and said, 'In this bottle I have medicine to cure the itch, the stitch, the palsy and the gout; pains within and pains without. I drop a drop into the palm of the dead man's hand, and a drop on his tongue, and say to him: Turk, arise, and get thee back to thine own country!'

The cure was instantaneous. The 'Turk' arose and joined the rest of the company, who all added something to the play.

I remember one little fat man who always had a row of dolls of various sizes on his back. He would say:

In come I, little happy Jack,
With my wife and my family on my back.
My head he's big, but my wits are small,
So I brought my fiddle to please 'ee all.

Then they all danced round until large jugs of beer appeared and a huge dish of mince pies – made specially for the occasion.

The theme of the play, no doubt, dated back to the Middle Ages, and it varied from county to county. In our village the play carried on very successfully until the First World War.

CHRISTMAS 100 YEARS AGO

From **Memories of Old Berkshire** by Jane M. Taylor

CHRISTMAS in those far-away days was very often a white one – not always snowy, but what was lovelier still, with a sparkling hoar frost.

About ten days before Christmas, the excitement began. Every evening as we sat round the fire, with shutters bolted and curtains drawn, we children would wonder, ‘Who will come tonight?’ Then up the gravel path outside the windows we would hear the slow tramp of heavy feet, and after a few minutes’ delay for whispered instructions, up would strike the village brass band.

Instead of the usual ‘Rule Britannia’ or ‘Two Little Girls in Blue’, they would play the good old Christmas hymns like ‘While Shepherds Watched’ and ‘Hark! The Herald Angels Sing’. After a good long programme they would pause, hoping the door would open and money be handed out – which, of course, always happened.

Another evening, the handbell ringers would come. I think I hear them now, the sweet tones of the bells ringing out on the frosty air.

Various small bands of children also sang hymns and simple carols, hoping for money for Christmas fare. They were not disappointed, as the spirit of generosity was abroad. But the real carol singers were men and women from the church and chapel choirs. They practised for weeks, and although untrained, sang most beautifully, not in unison but all taking their separate parts.

They would stand in a circle, with the light from their horn lanterns shining on their solemn rapt faces. The light was dim, being only from home-made tallow candles, but they were used to dark nights and unlighted roads, and knew all the words by heart.

But to us children the high spot of Christmas entertainment was the visit of the mummers. About eight or nine men would arrive outside and strike up with:

God bless the master of this house.
We hope he is within.
And if he is, pray tell us so
And us’ll soon step in.

My father would then open the door and invite them into our large paved kitchen and the show would begin, watched with bated breath by all of us ten children, our parents, the maids, and any visitors there might be.
