Council cuts

The Council has now outlined details of how it will accelerate the Transformation Programme to make the necessary £1.2million worth of savings, following cuts in Government grants. The aim is to secure financial sustainability over the next three years by restructuring the organisation, while making sure that services are delivered to those who are in most need.

The Leader of the Council, David Lee, said, 'With public spending being squeezed nationally, we face significant challenges to ensure our community continues to get high standards of service.'

The Executive Members are set to accelerate the Transformation Programme. 'Possible reductions' will be from:

Berkshire Connexions £100,000; WBC music services £30,000; Flooding £200,000

Primary targeted Support – Children services £30,000

Secondary Target Support – Children Services £30,000

From the Accelerated Transformation, the proposal is from:

Staffing reductions £65,000; Income generation £148,000;

Employee conditions £172,000; Procurement [acquisition] £15,000

The Chief Executive said, `We are looking to make internal changes that do not impact negatively on residents. However, reshaping the Council will mean that posts will be lost and by the end of this year [March 31st 2011] we anticipate reducing the workforce by 100 posts, by shredding agency staff, holding vacant posts and redeploying existing staff.'

Last but not least

Dumping of rubbish in our lanes is an enormous problem now. Can we all be on the lookout for the perpetrators, noting the vehicle's registration number if possible. These culprits are not villagers. Dumping waste is a criminal offence!

POLICE REPORT

From PCSO Anne Chalmers

Cold calling. A company calling themselves Crime Research UK are actively cold calling residents in this area. The caller will claim to be working in conjunction with the Police, Neighbourhood Watch or the Government (or indeed all three). The caller will ask if you are the home owner and if you are aged between 18 and 80 years of age. They say that you have been selected to receive a free home alarm, fitted and working, for just £1. Please do not invite these callers into your home. They are not working in conjunction with the Police. If you receive a call, note as many details as possible and contact your Neighbourhood Police Team on 0845 8 505 505.

Operation Lion Cub is running on Friday and Saturday evenings between 6pm and 2am. We have had a report of noise at the youth shelter. If the young people who use this facility are too noisy late at night and are affecting local residents' quality of life, please report the incident on the non-emergency police contact number.

For any anti-social behaviour such as groups congregating and causing noise and nuisance in your area, please call the non-emergency number *0845 8 505 505*.

Burglaries. As the warm summer evenings are with us, please be aware of open patio doors, open ground floor and bedroom windows. Statistically, burglary is not a common activity in the area. However, I urge residents to remain conscious of home security. Please don't become a victim.

Scrap metal. There has been an increasing interest in scrap metal across the Wokingham area. We have also received reports of theft of lead and other metals such as copper from premises. When stolen, it is usually transported in transit vans or open backed vehicles. Although there have been no reports as such from within Hurst, I would like to urge residents to report any suspicious activities.

Dinton Pastures. During patrols at the Dinton Pastures car park, it was noted that property is being left on show in locked vehicles. Please may we remind residents and visitors not to leave anything on show that might catch the attention of a thief.

Speeding. Residents of Hurst have concerns regarding vehicles speeding through the village. These concerns are taken on board and added to our list of hotspots in the area. The results of the Speed Indication Survey taken in July will be posted in our monthly Neighbourhood Police Teams update.

Visit to Dolphin School. PCSO Anne Chalmers and PCSO Nicola Shepherd attended Dolphin Primary School in Hurst and gave a 'safe and sound' personal safety talk to year 8 (13/14 year olds), who are preparing to go to their secondary schools in September.

School Road Playing field - New Play Equipment

I must begin with an apology to both the immediate residents living in close proximity to the park and to those parents/children who had expected the new equipment to be installed for the summer holidays.

Work did start on 7th June but was stopped the same day, due to concerns expressed by the residents living on the perimeter of the area. The Parish Council had been in communication with Wokingham for nearly a year discussing the project. Many site visits/proposals were made with WBC, in conjunction with Playbuilder, to consider both location and equipment type, and plans thereafter were approved.

Unfortunately, we were not made aware that the scheme should have gone out to public consultation, and at no point during our many meetings with WBC were we advised that this was the case. Informal discussions were made by a number of councillors while reviewing plans with a number of parents/children that use the park, although that was not formalised into a full consultation.

The work has now been stopped until we have carried out a consultation whereby residents can express their views.

To express your views on this subject, we would be very pleased to see you on 11th September, as below. To achieve the best feedback from Hurst villagers, it is important that you attend and not just feel everyone else will attend on your behalf.

STOP PRESS

Kentwood Farm - O/2020/0943 - Refused

Application from Crest Nicholson Operation Ltd for 357 dwellings with garages and carports, with a total of 569 parking spaces

The Council's view when recommending refusal stated that:

'This application site is located within the North Wokingham Strategic Development location [SDL] and therefore the broad principle of development here is acceptable.

Within North Wokingham SDL, there is a phased allocation for around 1500 new dwellings to be provided.'

This was the first phase and was refused.

The application was not considered acceptable for a number of reasons, inter alia

- it was premature as it was submitted in advance of the adoption of either the Masterplan SPD or the infrastructure delivery and contributions SPD
- it does not comply with the Development Plan Policy
- the proposal represents piecemeal development
- it does not incorporate a Northern Distributor Road, which is essential and a raft of other reasons!

It appears that residents have won round one!

Dinton Pastures Country Park celebrates its 30th anniversary this year

WHY GRAVEL CREATED DINTON PASTURES

The seven lakes, woodlands and meadows of Dinton Pastures Country Park were created from gravel pits dug out during the 1970s.

As gardeners know, gravel – pebbles, stones, flints and quartzite – is a plentiful natural resource in Hurst and it's here thanks to the River Loddon and changes in temperatures during the last Ice Age.

The 28-mile River Loddon rises in Basingstoke and flows through an area south of Hurst, where it is joined by the River Blackwater. Both rivers flow over bedrock made up of Paleogene deposits (laid down 60 - 55 million years ago) over chalk with flints (created 97 - 65 million years ago when this land was under a warm sea).

Cold periods during the last Ice Age (about 130,000 years ago) when the sea froze and water levels dropped meant that the River Loddon flowed

fast. The force of the water washed away bedrock, releasing stones and flints, which caused more erosion downstream. During warm periods, the river flowed slowly, allowing the stones and pebbles to settle in the wide floodplain around Hurst and Twyford and creating gravel terraces both sides of the river.

During the 1960s and 70s, landowners were keen to exploit this natural resource and meet the demands for aggregates in housing and road building. Hurst Village Society was created to fight the proposals to dig up farmland around the River Loddon. Residents resisted the plans unsuccessfully and endured decades of noise, dust and dirt as the gravel was dug and removed.

Wokingham District Council was keen to restore the area for people to enjoy, and wildlife soon moved into the flooded pits, meadows and woodlands, thus helping to create Dinton Pastures Country Park as we know it today.

Hurst Community First Responder

We now have a Community First Responder for Hurst. When a 999 call is received, the responder is dispatched at the same time as the ambulance. The responder, being local, is often at the scene sooner and usually arrives at the scene within eight minutes. This gives the responder the opportunity to treat any life-threatening conditions that need immediate care or treatment. A responder will primarily attend Category 'A' emergency 999 calls, which include heart attacks, strokes, breathing difficulties, unconscious patients, shock, diabetic emergencies and choking.

Responders are trained by the NHS but are completely self-funded. To ensure that we can give the best care in these situations, we do rely on donations from local businesses and community support as new kit, new supplies and training cost money.

Village Tales

LIFE ON THE FARM

The recent series on television 'Escape in Time' presented by Ben Fogel, gave a very graphic idea of life on a Victorian farm – working on the land, mucking out the cow stalls, boiling the weekly wash in a copper, and making everything for their own needs.

Sam Bullock in his Reminiscences of Old Hurst describes how it was in Hurst.

Quite three parts of the inhabitants worked on the land.

In harvest time the labourer, his wife and children would be fagging from daylight to dusk, no self-binders, and it used to take much longer to gather. ...

Then in the winter some would be in the barn threshing the corn out with a flail, which was two thorn sticks about an inch or so thick about 2 feet long joined together with a swivel so that they held one stick and twisted the other above their heads to thresh the sheaves with. Anyone not used to it would hit their head more than the corn.

After the corn was cut and carried, the women and children would go gleaning, as it was called, picking up all the ears of corn that were left on the ground. The short ones, or those with hardly any stalk, would be put in a pocket which was on the front of their aprons. The longer ones were done up in neat little bundles, taken to their own homes, threshed out and ground usually at Sandford Mill. Then they would make their own dough and bring it to the bakers for them to bake it into bread. Other times the women would be in the meadows and parks picking up stones, wood and acorns. Acorns they would give to their pigs, if they had any (most labourers had a pig or two in their sties). If not, the farmer would buy them at 9d or 1/- a bushel.

TREES AND THINGS ...

hen I first saw Tippens Wood, I did not want to buy it. It was the personification of the dark dark wood from nursery tales. You had to push your way through brambles, nettles and overgrown coppice every step of the way and it all seemed a bit pointless. Three years later and I am in a different place, albeit still clambering up a very steep learning curve.

Our small wood (which type apparently comprises 80% or so of UK woodlands) is classified as semi-ancient natural woodland, which means, in practice, that you cannot touch it without permission from the powers that be.

So off I went to the Forestry Commission. The local officer was very helpful and together we have drawn up a long term (10 years +) plan for its management and harvest. What I came to realise straight away is that trees are a crop. They grow, mature and die. The question is when, if ever, do you intervene and harvest?

It is not an easy choice as we all like to admire mature trees. But there comes a point where the wood cannot grow, as the over-storey (the tree canopy) forms a continuous blanket when in leaf and denies light to the woodland floor. Tippens Wood had reached that point many years earlier. That led to the harvesting of 80 odd oaks in late summer 2008.

Suddenly, the wood changed. Light got in and things started to grow again. We have also started to cut down the overgrown hazel coppice to give it a chance to regenerate – hopefully for wood chip supply in years to come. The brambles can now be kept under some sort of control and the wildlife has started to come back.

We are currently engaged on a programme of thinning the ash trees, which again have reached maturity. It is all a question of balance. Hopefully next year we can think of replanting for future generations.

When we bought the wood, the vendor said 'Don't worry about the wood - it looks after itself.' It all depends what you mean by 'looking after', I guess. It seems to keep us involved year round and I really enjoy seeing the changes slowly take place.
