### **Sale of Alcohol at the Village Halls**

Under the new licensing regulations, the Village Hall is only allowed 12 licences each calendar year where alcohol may be sold. This is seriously inhibiting the Hall's ability to allow functions that require a cash bar. Most of the local societies have already booked one of the 12 licences and our opportunity to support wedding receptions and other parties is compromised. The only long term solution is to apply to have our Premise's Licence varied to include the sale of alcohol. The Halls Committee has now set this action in motion and hopefully I will be able to report a successful outcome in the summer newsletter.

### **1st Hurst Air Scouts**

1st Hurst Air Scouts is a vibrant active group in the village catering to the scouting needs of boys (and girls) from ages 6 through to 14. At present fifty seven boys, involved in Beavers (6-8), Cubs (8-10½) and Scouts (10½-14), are participating in an action packed programme of activities including the district cooking competition, aviation simulation at RAF Benson, Three Towers hike, astronomy and the summer Family Camp at Phasels Wood in Hertfordshire. ## Planning Matters for February/March 2006

Over the past few months we objected to the commercial and storage development at **Pikes Farm**, Forest Road. The District Council's Development Control Committee unanimously refused this application, which would have brought even more traffic to the notorious crossroads with the A321 Wokingham Road at an accident blackspot, and industrialised the countryside.

The council also refused permission to remove the agricultural occupancy condition on **Grange Farm** House in Nelsons Lane.

Under the **Natural Environment and Rural Communities Bill**, currently in Parliament, roads used as public paths, and not previously designated as Byways, were in danger of being closed to motor vehicles. This would prevent 'green laning' by people on scramble bikes and in 4x4 vehicles. A consequence of this would be to make it impossible for people with properties accessed from unmade, undesignated tracks to get to their homes, fields and outbuildings. An amendment is being made to the Bill so that people will be able to reach their properties. In Hurst this means that unmade tracks to properties now have to be designated Byways Open to All Traffic, and walkers, cyclists and horse riders will have to contend with lorries and other vehicles on previously quiet and peaceful tracks.

Lastly, the District Council seems to have got itself in a tangle at **Dinton Pastures**. An application to erect black polyethylene netting 7 metres high for more than 600 metres alongside the first and second tees at the Black Swan Golf Club was objected to by the Parish Council, Golf Club Manager and HVS. The council has withdrawn the application. It is alleged that a person walking on the Country Park footpath was hit and injured by a golf ball. There are signs along the footpath to warn walkers and cyclists of the dangers of wayward golf balls – so please take care!

If you're interested in planning and its effect on our village, please consider joining the HVS committee. **Wendy Tobitt is resigning**, so we're looking for someone to monitor the planning lists.

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### From Jackie Daniels – Police Community Support Officer for Hurst

Twyford Police Station is now resourced by volunteers on Mondays 2pm – 6pm and again in Saturdays 10am – 2pm. We are looking to extend these times when more volunteers are trained to use the front counter. Local residents will no longer have to travel to Wokingham or Loddon Valley with enquiries as they will be able to come to Twyford!

As in my last newsletter there have been a number of burglaries where vehicle keys and, subsequently, cars have been stolen. The majority have been overnight, so please make sure windows and doors are locked. These incidents are being investigated, but please don't make it easy for the burglars – take your keys, handbags etc upstairs with you at night!!

## **View from Shute End**

### **Wokingham Unitary Councillor, Annette Drake, reports:**

#### **Fly tipping**

There are reports of 3 piece suites and other furniture dumped in hedgerows, ditches, footpaths or streams. Their removal adds to the burden of the Council Tax payer and therefore we need to be aware of the regulations with regard to correct disposal.

The Council's Contractor SITA offers an excellent value collection scheme for bulky items of furniture. They will collect up to five items from one site at a cost of £17. Fridges, which need to have special disposal treatment to comply with government regulations, are charged separately at £27 per item. The service is free to senior citizens. There is no charge if items are taken to a licensed tip. **SITA** can be contacted on **0800 838878**

In order to keep our District free from unsightly rubbish, the Council needs your co-operation in ensuring that any builder or contractor employed to work on your property is going to dispose of the waste correctly. Small traders should take waste to a licensed tip where they will be charged based on its weight. They will be asked to complete waste transfer documentation and are required to keep copies of this for at least 2 years. Failure to produce documentation is an offence under the Environmental Protection Act. Such waste may not be disposed of as part of household rubbish.

Wherever possible, please let the Council know the location, vehicle number and a brief description of anyone seen fly-tipping. The information can be phoned through to the **Waste Services team**, via the customer call desk on **0118 974 6000**.

#### **Health Walks**

These are short walks where you are encouraged to walk at a brisk pace to increase fitness levels. The Countryside Service has been awarded the top 3 Heart Kite mark by the Countryside Agency & the British Heart Foundation for its programme of 16 free Health Walks. #### **Biodiversity Forum. Barn Owl Project**

2006 will be the fourth year for monitoring the custom built barn owl nest boxes installed by the Countryside Services. In 2004 only 2 chicks were recorded in the district, however last year the owl population bounced back with a bumper 18 chicks being found.

## Hurst Pantomime Group

Can it really be over a year since the Village Hall stage was set alight by the sparkling performances and magnificent production from the cast and crew of Snow White? Well, with the roar of the crowd still ringing in their ears, plans are already underway for the next biennial Hurst pantomime scheduled to run from **January 11<sup>th</sup> to 13<sup>th</sup> 2007**. In what promises to be the most colourful and ambitious project yet, the committee agreed at a recent meeting to stage a production of **Aladdin** in 2007.

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### Can we afford to loose St Nicholas church?

Over the years inflation has affected us all and the Church of England is no exception but unlike individuals it has also lost most of its central support from the Church Commissioners (now only 3% of the Diocese Budget). This means parishes now have to pay for all the costs of ministry, pensions, housing, training, etc., as well as the costs of operation of our facilities and their maintenance.

Reducing numbers has meant the financial load falls heavily on those who do attend church regularly so this trend must be reversed or it will ultimately mean that unless these costs are met churches will close, and reduced numbers of ministers will be distributed sparsely amongst communities.

In recent years, with its 2 churches, our parish has been eroding its reserves in order to pay for the costs of ministry in the parish, for which we are expected to contribute £43,593 in 2006. The major source of income is through regular giving from the congregation, which for 2005 was £14,000 plus £4,000 in Tax recovered from the Inland Revenue for the previous year. £18,000 is well short of that required to provide the service to the community, let alone operational costs.

A simple analysis of this sort does not begin to tell the whole story, but could the community exist without its church? It is after all named after it, has strong links with St Nicholas school and offers the rites of passage to the community, as well as the prayers and worship, care and support offered week by week.

We welcomed over 400 people of all ages to the 3 services at St Nicholas during Christmas Eve and Day and consequently income rose healthily for those days, but for a normal Sunday service the average is only 40.
